The **"Glass Bridge"** footbridge across the motorway from Eccles station/Church Street is now closed to replace the ageing superstructure. The closure is for up to 3 months. ESN readers who normally use this bridge to reach Eccles station will find the the diversions are via Albert Road or Gilda Brook Road. The station itself is unaffected so please make a few more minutes for your journey








The retaining wall at the back of platform 2 (Liverpool platform) has been stripped of its ivy and most of the weeds growing out of the mortar between the bricks have been cut off. The wall has been marked out with various mysterious numbers and perhaps it is due to be repointed as it certainly needs it. However, the work has resulted in some damage to the planting on the rockery which **members of FRECCLES** are now working to put right.



Work is continuing on the Ordsall Chord scheme. The girder bridge over the Irwell to the Great Western side of Liverpool Road goods station has been removed to reveal the original Stephenson crossing of the river which will undergo restoration.



It is looking as if the South Junction viaduct will be widened on the south side and track added to cross Ordsall Lane, judging by the work taking place near the former Duncan Transrail area.



Liverpool and The Wirral

ESN has recently been revisiting parts of Liverpool and the Wirral peninsula. A cheap and quick train ride from Eccles Station in that direction offers a host of leisure options for days or afternoons out. Just a few are chosen here to illustrate the possibilities.

At Lime Street descend to the Wirral line and visit Port Sunlight, the delightful village created for the workforce at the Sunlight Soap factory by William Lever, later Lord Leverhulme.



In the centre is the most amazing art gallery built as a memorial to his wife. When ESN visited there was a small exhibition of how Picasso developed his own way of doing lino cut prints.









In the opposite direction on the Wirral line is New Brighton a small village surrounded by acres of sandy beach and with fine view across to Liverpool.





ESN took the opportunity to break the journey at Birkenhead Hamilton Square. The square is large and impressive. It is a fine early nineteenth century creation worth seeing for itself. ESN went off the square at the corner nearest the station to visit Gallagher's (but not for a hair cut).







In Liverpool itself ESN visited the Walker Art Gallery which was also hosting the John Moore's Prize exhibition at the time.



The Walker has an impressive collection including a crowded array of fine statuary in one room.
